Name: Constantin Martin Position: School Principal

1. How did you adjust to being the school principal?

I adjusted fairly quickly because I have been a teacher in this school since September 2001 and I was also a school inspector for 12 years, so I knew a lot about the law and school management, teachers and staff.

2. What things do you miss from the time when you were a teacher?

My spare time. My current programme requires me to be at school every day from 7.30 until 15.30.

3. What is your relationship with the students?

When I was a teacher I had a good relationship. In general, students from the classes I taught love History and love the atmosphere created in class. Of course there are exceptions. The reason mostly cited by students was the low marks.

4. What are your plans for the future?

As far as my profession is concerned, I would like to make some changes in school both in developing the educational process and improving the school teaching materials stock. This year we are going to begin a process of total rehabilitation of the buildings and this worries me a little.

5. How would you describe the students in our college?

I must admit frankly that at present the "loan Slavici" National College is the most attractive option for the students in the 8th grade, and this is data taken from a survey conducted recently. This is due to the prestige of our school, the quality of

teaching and the diversity of the profiles. So I could say that we have mostly good students, some even very good, but like any school we have a few weak ones. I'd like to mention that among those very good students there are students coming from rural areas.

6. What would you like to change in the students' behaviour?

I would like our students to be punctual for all school activities and I would like them to be more involved in the activities taking place after classes.

7. Do you have some tips for us, the students?

I think experience allows me to give some tips to help students. Firstly, it's good if you can make a clear distinction between classes and breaks. Then you should also make a distinction between the way you dress at school and outside the classrooms. I advise you not to miss at all the sports classes, which are very important for your physical development. Furthermore, I think it would be good if you took up a sport in your free time. When possible, you should spend weekends in a nice company, formed especially by colleagues. Students must understand that their activities at school provide the foundation for their future career and they also help them to develop harmoniously.

Position: School Deputy Principal

1. We know you are involved in and you support many of the students' activities, could you tell us about them?

I don't know if there are a multitude of activities but I have the duty to monitor and sustain all the educational activities, both curricular and extracurricular.

Unfortunately time doesn't allow students and teachers to get involved as much as they would like to. There is always a selection of the most interesting activities. I like to be asked for and offer support to our students, mostly when it is about projects which involve an active citizenship.

2. What do you miss the most from the time when you were a teacher?

The activity in class. Now I only teach two classes but I have a feeling of melancholy in connection with teaching, especially at classes from high school where lessons often turn into real debates.

3. What is your relationship with the students?

I think it is a positive relationship; this is the way I perceive it and I hope that their opinion is the same.

4. What are your plans for the future?

I would like our school to continue to be in the top when it comes to the students' options and I would like us to be more present in the community life, both through the school's result and civic activities.



5. How would you describe the students in our college?

To paraphrase Călinescu, I would say that students are teenagers from always and from everywhere. They are impetuous, nonconformists, they imagine that they own the absolute truth, but at the same time they are responsible, conscientious. Maybe they aren't brave enough, sometimes they don't have confidence in themselves, and even the society doesn't offer a the horizon they dream of.

6. What would you like to change in students' behaviour?

Education is very important and to be disciplined and neat doesn't mean to stick to the wall when a teacher passes by. You should greet your teachers and wait for them quietly in your desks, you should keep the school and the classrooms tidy, and it would be good for you to show respect for work in general.

7. Do you have some advice for us, the students?

I wrote an article in Muguri magazine addressed to our coming graduates but I consider it is suitable for all students. I would like them all to realize that "to live" means "to know" and you cannot know without studying.

I wish you all that your dreams come true. I also wish you that everything you will do won't be only for your personal and professional completion, but also for the good of society. You might think these are big words, but nothing durable can be built without the consciousness of the future.

"Learning for the society of knowledge"

As some of you may or may not know, our school has recently enrolled in a transdisciplinary project called Learning for a society of knowledge, which is also a contest. The winning schools from all over Romania get modern multi-touch equipment, which can make teachers' jobs easier and enables us, the students, to better understand the lessons we are being thought.

This project was initially thought of back in 2008, when several people wanted to show that Romania can have high quality education, that every student in Romania has the right to know about technology which can offer easier education, and that they even benefit from this technology. The project was finally launched in December 2009 with the help of the "Projects Management Unit of External Financing", the "Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports", "Carol I" University of National Defense and SIVECO Romania.

Several students from our school were asked if they wanted to join, and in the end 26 were selected, all of them being from the 11th grade. The students meet once a week and are prepared by the following teachers: Antonela Porumbăcean, Nicoleta Piţig, Agota Lupou, Camelia Ruba, Simona Păcurar and Ioana Văsuţ. The first topic to be discussed at the meetings is called "Image and imagination" and it is tackled from the perspectives of various school subjects: history, biology, geography, physics, psychology and mathematics, using videos and presentations to make it easier to explain the subject that is being discussed at the meeting.

At the moment the project is at its early stages, and we are still getting used to what's to be done. Weţll tell you more in EML's next issue. But we can all hope and keep our fingers crossed that in the end our school will manage to win this project and get the benefit of having a multi-touch lab installed.
